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

Al Awtrey

HBAA SAYS GOODBYE TO PAST PRESIDENT AWTREY

The HBAA is mourning the loss of longtime member Al Awtrey, who passed away on August 6. A native of Birmingham, Awtrey was a decorated World War II veteran

who worked as a firefighter upon his return home before entering the home building industry. He started his first building company in 1959 and joined the Greater Birmingham Association of Home Builders in 1961.

Awtrey was the first GBAHB builder member to achieve "Super Spike" status,

having recruited more than 250 members. In 1964, he constructed the first "scholarship house" in the Birmingham Parade of Homes, in which the proceeds were used to fund a scholarship for a deserving recipient. He served as GBAHB President in 1968 and was inducted into the GBAHB Hall of Fame in 1986. The GBAHB annually presents the Al Awtrey Builder of the Year Award in recognition of the association's outstanding builder.

At the state level, Awtrey served as HBAA President in 1975 and was among the first group of inductees in the Alabama Home Builders Hall of Fame in 1988. He was also extremely active within the National Association of Home Builders, serving as a National Life Director and a member of the National Housing Board.

Awtrey was extremely active in civic activities related to housing, heading up the Partnership for Assistance to the Homeless and serving as Chairman of Birmingham's Housing and Zoning Commission. In 2009, he was honored for his service to his community with the Freedom Award from the city of Hoover.

Awtrey was preceded in death by his eldest son, Albert Lawrence (Larry) Awtrey, who was also a member of the GBAHB. The HBAA extends its sympathies to Awtrey's family and friends, including his daughter, Donna Awtrey Trapp, his son, Russell Scott Awtrey, and his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

HBAA MOURNS LOSS OF LONGTIME EO WHEELOCK

The HBAA is mourning the loss of Elizabeth Alston Shivers Wheelock, who passed away on September 20. Wheelock served as the Executive Officer for the Home Builders Association of Dothan & the Wiregrass Area from 1981 to 2009. Throughout her 28-year tenure, the Dothan association grew from 99 members to nearly 500 members and won numerous awards, including the HBAA President's Trophy six times. She was instrumental in building the Dothan association's scholarship program, which has helped hundreds of students. Upon her retirement a scholarship was established in her name.

A native of Marion, Wheelock graduated from Judson College and was a resident of Dothan for most of her adult life. She was a longtime advocate of causes such as the Special Olympics, the Dothan Botanical Gardens, the Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity and the Girls Club. She spearheaded many projects at the Vivian B. Adams School in Ozark, including a greenhouse project where students enjoyed handson learning about gardening and flowers.

Wheelock was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, Hugh Franklin Wheelock, Sr. and a sister, Mildred Shivers Sheen. The HBAA extends its sympathy to Wheelock's friends and family, including her three children, Hugh F. Wheelock, Jr., Laurin Wheelock and Lewitt

OSHA ANNOUNCES NEW REQUIREMENTS FOR REPORTING SEVERE INJURIES

The U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration has announced a final rule requiring employers to notify OSHA when an employee is killed on the job or suffers a work-related hospitalization, amputation or loss of an eye. The rule, which also updates the list of employers partially exempt from OSHA record-keeping requirements, will go into effect on January 1, 2015 for workplaces under federal OSHA jurisdiction.

Under the revised rule, employers will be required to notify OSHA of any work-related fatalities within eight hours (same as before), and for a single employee, any work-related in-patient hospitalizations, amputations or losses of an eye within 24 hours. Previously, OSHA's regulations required an employer to report fatalities and in-patient hospitalizations of three or more employees. Reporting single hospitalizations, amputations or loss of an eye was not required under the previous rule.

All employers covered by the Occupational Safety and Health Act, even those who are exempt from maintaining injury and illness records, are required to comply with OSHA's new severe injury and illness reporting requirements. To assist employers in fulfilling these requirements, OSHA is developing a Web portal for employers to report incidents electronically, in addition to the phone reporting options. "Hospitalizations and amputations are sentinel events, indicating that serious hazards are likely to be present at a workplace and that an intervention is warranted to protect the other workers at the establishment," said Dr. David Michaels, assistant secretary of labor for occupational safety and health.

The Trustees of the Alabama Home Builders Self Insurers Fund recently approved a \$15 million dividend for qualifying Fund members. More than 76% of Fund members were eligible for the dividend this year. In the past two years, between dividends and safety credits, the Fund has returned more than \$40 million to qualifying members.

SPEED COUNTS AT GBAHB **FAST PITCH EVENT**



GBAHB REMODELERS' FISH FRY DRAWS OVER 100 FOR FOOD AND FELLOWSHIP



H/MCBA MEMBERS APPOINTED TO CONSTRUCTION APPEALS BOARD



How do you transform a nearly century-old warehouse into a residence without losing the historic patina of the structure? That was the challenge faced by Lee County Home Builders Association member HF&L Construction, Inc. when the company was hired to turn this industrial building into a home for a young, growing family in downtown Auburn.

It was a challenge readily accepted by Greg Langston of HF&L, who was eager to get his hands on an historic structure. "I love history and I've always wanted to restore an older home, but most of the old homes in Auburn have been torn down, " he said.

Located just a stone's throw from Auburn University, the building had been through many incarnations in its history. Built in 1920, it had housed at various times a pool hall, night club, grocery store, clothing store, cab company, recycling center, restaurants, a cabinet shop and even a church before its current turn as a dwelling.

"We were drawn to the idea of having large, generous spaces for the house," said homeowner David Hill. "We were in love with the brickwork when we saw the building. We really like how tough the building is. In general, the kids can be rough and tough and the building can handle it well."

Hill, an architect and founding principal of HILLworks
Landscape + Architecture as well as an assistant professor
of landscape architecture at Auburn University, designed the
renovation to fit his family's needs while keeping as much of
the structure's history intact as possible.

"We didn't realize how amazing the history of the building is," said Hill. "We started researching the history, which we made publicly available [see end of article for details]. Once we found out that the building had such a rich background, we knew that we wanted to preserve the spirit of the structure. That spirit is not just the massive walls, but also the layers of paint on those walls. Each layer has a separate story to tell."

What was originally four separate commercial spaces was turned into an approximately 3,000 square-foot, four bedroom, two and a half bath home. The bathrooms, laundry, closets and storage were strategically situated to separate bedrooms from the home's public space, which incorporates an open-concept kitchen, dining and living area. Among the homeowner's favorite features are a huge, 1,000-pound sliding metal door that separates the two living areas and a garden on the east side of the home.

Along the way, care was taken to preserve and re-use certain elements of the original structure. The metal stamped ceiling tiles from 1920 were carefully removed, restored and rehung.

Plaster replicas were created to replace any missing corner pieces along the crown molding. Pads of impermeable concrete in the landscape were carefully cut, disassembled and reused, this time with their formerly concealed aggregates now exposed on the surface.

Langston is particularly proud of the restoration of the awning covering the south and west sides of the sidewalk. "It was in terrible disrepair, but we were able to restore it while keeping its historic integrity."

In addition to preserving the home's historic features, the design plan included several energy-efficient features, such as low flow fixtures and dual flush toilets in the bathrooms. Bamboo flooring was installed throughout. Rainwater is harvested from the roof and used in the garden.

"David [Hill] worked hard to take something old and antiquated and make it green," said Langston.

The project was not without its challenges, considering not only the structure's age but also its original use as four separate commercial spaces that had to be opened up and transformed into a single residential space. Much of the building had to be brought up to today's code, a far cry from the way buildings were constructed a century ago. According to Langston, opening up solid brick and mortar interior walls that were eight to ten inches thick proved to be one of the greater challenges. Overall, the renovation took approximately six months to complete.

The project earned HF&L Construction the first-place award in the Historic Preservation category and second place in the Space Renovation category of the 2012 Alabama Remodeling Excellence Awards competition, presented annually by the HBAA's Remodelers. The home has won several other awards, including a 2011 Award of Merit from the Montgomery Chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA), a 2012 Award of Merit from the Alabama Chapter of AIA, a 2013 Watermark Grand Award for its kitchen, and a 2013 Award of Merit from the Alabama Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects.

Founded in 1989, HF&L Construction specializes in custom and spec new construction as well as renovations. Although this was the company's first historic renovation project, Langston hopes that it will not be the last.

This was such a big challenge, but it was so rewarding because it turned out so well. I'm really proud of it.

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CELEBRATING 30 YEARS

This October marks the 30th anniversary of the founding of the Alabama Home Builders Self Insurers Fund. Over the next year, each issue of Alabama Homebuilder magazine will feature an in-depth look at the Fund, from its humble beginnings to becoming one of the HBAA's most popular member benefits.

The year 1984 turned out to be a pivotal year for the Home Builders Association of Alabama. With the industry slowly recovering from the abysmal housing slump of the early 1980s, many in the insurance market remained reluctant to provide coverage for residential construction. Finding workers' comp coverage at any cost, let alone at reasonable rates, was nearly impossible for many HBAA members.

In response to its members' needs for affordable coverage, the HBAA, led by then-President Jerry Kyser, took a leap of faith in forming the Alabama Home Builders Self Insurers Fund on October 1, 1984. A core group of 25 members stepped up to help form the Fund, which required a minimum of \$600,000 in contributions (better known as premiums in the insurance world). Many of those members took on not only the risk of a new program but also put up more money than they had to in order to meet the contribution requirement.

John Howard of Metro Mobile served as the Fund's first Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Fellow founding Trustees included Wayne Bonner (Huntsville/Madison County), Phillip Dutton (Jackson County), Robert Holk (Baldwin County), Don Nolan (Phenix City), Bentley Owens (Greater Birmingham), and Ted Watts (Greater Montgomery).

In the first year of its existence, the Fund grew to 645 members, with roughly a third of the HBAA's membership at that time participating in the Fund, and \$800,000 in contributions.

By the start of the 1990s, the Fund had 1,800 participants and \$12 million in contributions. Initially the management of the Fund was outsourced, but as it grew and matured it became increasingly apparent that it would be best run in-house. The first underwriting staff was hired in 1988, followed by accounting staff in 1992. In less than a decade, what had begun as a bold move to benefit members had clearly paid off, as the Fund was quickly becoming one of the biggest selling points of HBAA membership.

The next time you're at a state or local HBA meeting or event, take a good look around. Odds are that the majority of the members in attendance are associate members. Of the more than 7,200 members in the HBAA, roughly 75% are associates. These include subcontractors, sales and marketing specialists, architects, interior designers, title and settlement experts, lawyers, people in the financial services industry, product suppliers and manufacturers, and many more who are essential to the challenging task of providing housing for a growing population.

"Many of my builder and remodeler friends have also been very valuable business partners over the years. We have celebrated victories and worked through difficulties together. Many of my associate friends and I share opportunity leads, and pass each other's names on to assist our builders and remodelers to find the best business partners to work with and to allow them the opportunity to do business with a member first."

Many associates find that the benefits of being a member go far beyond the potential to earn new business, particularly when they become actively involved at the local and state levels.

"Being an associate member has increased my family members tremendously," said Peggy Turner, GBAHB member and owner of Graphic Designs & Promotions, Inc. "Who could say they just returned from the beach with 800 of their closest friends?"

"I have made some great friends and pulled through some great business deals by doing business with other members," said Cathy Brown of Alabama Power, a member of the Greater Montgomery Home Builders Association. "Getting involved is great fun and rewarding both personally and professionally. How could you be in the building industry and not be a member?"

Estreicher credits the friendships and connections made through his association membership with giving him a leg up on his non-member competition during the economic downturn.

"I am convinced that many of my GBAHB and HBAA builder and remodeler friends stayed loyal to me and purchased my products during the recession even in the presence of less expensive competitors, as we enjoy a common bond and hold ourselves to higher professional standards more so than just whom can provide the least costly widget," said Estreicher.

To honor their hardworking associate members, some of the local HBAs hold special events throughout the year. The GBAHB hosted an Associate Appreciation Night in September, which has been designated as National Associate Appreciation Month by the National Association of Home Builders. Associate members were treated to a tailgating party at the GBAHB office for the Auburn-Kansas State game, with plenty of food and door prizes. The event was sponsored by several of the GBAHB's builder members.

Likewise, the Shoals Home Builders Association hosts an annual Associate Appreciation Night featuring free food and door prizes for their associate members. Past events have included a football party and a low-country shrimp boil. The nights give builder members the opportunity to thank the associate members for the support that they provide.

Associate members who are already active at the local level are encouraged to come to the HBAA's meetings and get involved at the state level as well. The HBAA has long benefitted from a strong Associates Committee comprised of members who have been actively involved for years and who echo the sentiments of Turner: "As long as the good Lord lets me be able...I WILL be a participating member!"

The Safety 6 Construction Course is based on OSHA's 10-hour construction safety course but condensed into one day. It covers common residential and light commercial jobsite hazards and offers practical injury prevention measures, including information about products that can make jobsites safer and more productive.

The class also provides instruction on how to respond to an OSHA inspection, as well as guidelines and materials for developing an effective safety and health program. OSHA is pursuing more citations under the multi-employer rule, which can hold the builder accountable for the safety violations of subcontractors under certain circumstances. Builders can learn how to protect themselves from OSHA citations and penalties by attending this course.

Attendees will receive a manual on the course topics, a CD with numerous safety resources and a course completion wallet card. The cost is \$35 per person and covers course materials, snacks and lunch.
